Do not mix opioids with alcohol, benzodiazepines (Xanax, Ativan, Klonopin, Valium), or medicines that make you sleepy.

What is an opioid overdose?

An opioid overdose occurs when there is an excessive amount of opioids in the body that overwhelms the respiratory system. Opioids slow down breathing, and in an overdose situation, breathing can become dangerously shallow or stop altogether.

Naloxone can help save lives until EMS arrives.
